A. *Michigan Great Start Readiness Program Evaluations: 20 Years of Collaboration*

Tomoko Wakabayashi

Tomoko Wakabayashi is Director of the Center for Early Education Evaluation at HighScope. Dr. Wakabayashi currently serves as the Principal Investigator for the Michigan Department of Education funded Great Start Readiness Program Evaluation, and several early childhood-related projects. Prior to joining HighScope in 2011, Dr. Wakabayashi served as Research Manager for a national home visiting model, as well as a postdoctoral research coordinator for an experimental psychology lab at Stanford University. She has also taught as an Adjunct Faculty at Stanford and San Jose State University. Dr. Wakabayashi has an Ed.D in Human Development and Psychology from Harvard Graduate School of Education.

Richard Lower

Richard Lower is Director of Preschool and Out-of-School Time Learning within the Office of Great Start of the Michigan Department of Education. *E. Classification Tree Analysis: A Useful Statistical Tool for Program Evaluators***Meredith L. Philyaw, MS**

During graduate school, I completed an ORISE fellowship at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention focused on patient-reported outcome measurement and analysis. Many of the recent evaluations I have led or assisted with required managing, cleaning and analyzing large administrative, Electronic Medical Record and survey datasets. As part of these projects, I used classification tree analysis to identify effective child support enforcement strategies and illuminate subgroups of patients who are less likely to follow through on treatment referrals in a behavioral health demonstration project. I have experience presenting the results of classification tree analyses to clients and practitioners with varying levels of statistical knowledge and have also previously demonstrated implementing the technique in JMP to MSW students.
